Below you will find a list of twelve things that either Indonesia or Compassion International is known for. In parenthesis is what you have to take a picture of. The picture has to be taken by your family and cannot be a picture of another picture or a picture of a screen. Email your pictures (in one email if possible) to Pastor Brett at blevy@fbg.church. 1. Sulawesi is known for some very old cave paintings! (Picture of a painting for 300 points)
2. Compassion sponsors give \$38 a month to provide for a child. (Picture of \$38 for 200 points)
3. Indonesia is home to one of the largest gold mines on the planet! (Picture of something that is 24 karat gold for 300 points)
4. Indonesia (but thankfully not Sulawesi) is home to the Komodo Dragon. (Picture of a living reptile for 500 points or non-living reptile for 200 points)
5. Compassion International was founded in 1952. (Picture of something dated older than 1952 for 500 points)
6. Soccer, tennis, and badminton are major sports in Indonesia. (Picture of a soccer ball for 100 points; OR a tennis racket for 200 points; or a badminton birdie for 500 points)
7. Rice is a staple of the Sulawesi diet. (Picture of some rice for 100 points OR picture of the sticky rice you made as a family for 800 points)
8. Even though Sulawesi is primarily Muslim, they still celebrate Christmas. (Picture of a Christmas decoration for 200 points OR a full-sized Christmas tree for 600 points)
9. Compassion brings Scripture to people all over the world. Many people do not own a Bible. (50 points for every non-digital Bible you have in your house)
10. NFL football player Nate Solder used the "My Cause, My Cleats" campaign by the NFL to bring awareness to Compassion International. (Picture of a pair of cleats for 200 points)
11. The world's largest flower is the Rafflesia Arnoldi and is only found in Indonesia. It can weigh 15 pounds! (Picture of a flower for 200 points)
12. In 2005 a group in Indonesia broke the Guinness Book of World Record for "The Largest Packet of Instant Noodles", creating a packet that weighed over 1,460 pounds. It was made using the same ingredients as a regular pack of instant noodle and was certified fit for human consumption. (Picture of Ramen Noodles for 300 points)
