- C. A broad look at application:
1. Reflect the intent –
  2. How will I apply what I understand?
    - If application is knowledge then use these verbs for stating your application: List, state, enumerate, recite, recall, write, identify, memorize, know, trace, delineate, become familiar with, define, describe, recognize.
    - If the application involves insight then use these verbs for specifying your application: Compare, contrast, classify, select, choose, evaluate, examine, comprehend, think through, discern, understand, discover.
    - If the application involves your attitudes then use these verbs for clarifying your application: determine to, develop, have confidence in, appreciate, be convinced of, be sensitive to, commit yourself to, be enthusiastic about, desire to, sympathize with, view, plan, feel satisfied with.

- If the application has to do with certain skills or practices then try these verbs for your application: interpret, apply, internalize, produce, use, practice, study, solve, experience, explain, communicate, assist in, pray about.<sup>1</sup>

E. Guidelines to Evaluation of Application

1. **Personal, specific, realistic and measurable.**
2. Intent – limited or broad?
3. Can your application be refuted by anything else in Scripture?
